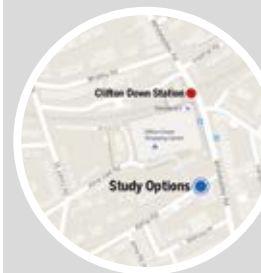

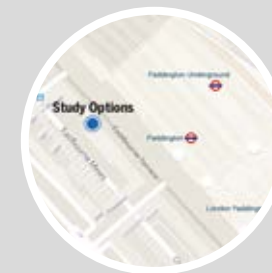

YOU WANT... TO WORK WITH ANIMALS

Possible careers: Farmer, park ranger, horse breeder or trainer, pet shop owner, veterinary nurse, animal welfare worker, fisheries worker

These courses will teach you how to operate a vineyard – studying soil conditions, pruning the vines and picking the grapes. In the holidays you could get a job picking and processing grapes, as workers in the grape-growing industry are always in high demand. So all you need to do is decide whether you want spend your holidays working in Margaret River, Hawkes Bay, Marlborough or the Hunter Valley...



YOU WANT... TO WORK IN THE CARE INDUSTRY

Possible careers: Youth worker, welfare worker, community services officer, outreach officer, family support worker, child care worker, nanny

Do you want to work with children or the elderly? The care industry is one of the fastest growing in Australia and New Zealand, as well as one of the most diverse. Job prospects are very good, and with an ageing population worldwide, together with a growing demand for improved health and welfare services, the current high levels of demand for workers in the industry are set to continue. Whatever area you decide to pursue you will be involved in a challenging but extremely rewarding career.



YOU WANT... TO WORK IN HOSPITALITY

Possible careers: Chef, baker, hotel manager, café manager

The hospitality industry is huge in Australia and New Zealand, and both countries take it very seriously. With strong employment opportunities all over the world it's a great sector to be involved in. Courses in Australia and New Zealand are strongly industry focused and will set you on the right path for your career in hospitality, whether you fancy opening up a local independent coffee shop or aspire to a Michelin star.



YOU WANT... TO LEARN A NEW TRADE

Possible careers: Bricklayer, cabinet maker, mechanic, locksmith, painter and decorator, plasterer, floor and wall tiler, wall and ceiling liner, welder, fitter

Would you like to retrain in an internationally recognised trade and get a sought-after new skill? Tradespeople are currently in high demand all over the world, including in Australia and New Zealand. Trades training courses provide the practical and theoretical training that will enable you to work in your chosen trade. You need to be physically fit for these, and prepared to spend a lot of time on your feet, but it'll all be worth it when you think of the job prospects available when you qualify.



The big questions

The idea of going to the other side of the world to study always raises lots of questions. Here, we answer a few of the queries we get asked most often

When do courses start?

Semester 1 begins in February and semester 2 starts in July. Some courses do have more regular intakes – please contact Study Options to check what's available.

What qualifications will I need to get a place?

Each college sets its own entry requirements so they vary, depending on what and where you want to study. For certificate and diploma courses you will generally need GCSEs or the equivalent. It's also possible to qualify for mature age entry on the basis of work experience.

How long will it take to find out whether I've got a place?

It should only take up to four weeks at most to find out if you have been given an offer.

When should I apply?

We always recommend applying sooner rather than later. Places on popular courses fill up quickly, so get your application to Study Options in plenty of time to make sure you don't miss out. If you are travelling with a family, it's definitely better to allow lots of time to everything organised – including school places for your kids – rather than leaving it to the last minute. Having said that, however, if you do not have many ties and can get yourself ready to go at short notice – or if you are already living in Australia or New Zealand – we can turn paperwork around very quickly, so can

accept applications right up until a few weeks before the course starts.

Will I need a visa to study?

Yes, you'll need to get a student visa. For more information about visas, please see www.studyoptions.com/visas

When do I apply for my student visa?

You can only apply for your visa once you have received a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) from an Australian college, or a fees receipt from a New Zealand college. In order to obtain a CoE or a fees receipt, you must have been given a formal offer of place by the college, accepted it in writing and paid a deposit toward your tuition fees, so your student visa actually one of the last things to organise.

How much do courses cost?

Each college sets its own tuition fees, so the cost of a course will vary depending on what subject, type of qualification and college you go for, but you can usually expect to pay somewhere between A\$7,500 and A\$15,000 per year in Australia and NZ\$15,000 to NZ\$20,000 per year in New Zealand for tuition.

What other costs are involved?

On top of course fees you will need to budget for the cost of living. This will vary considerably depending where you want to live and study.



I WANT TO GO WITH MY PARTNER. CAN THEY WORK WHILE I STUDY?

On the Australian subclass 500 student visa your partner can work up to a maximum of 20 hours per week during your study. For New Zealand, your partner will need to apply for their own visa to be in the country, though they will be able to apply for a work visa as a partner of a student who is studying for a qualification in an area of absolute skill shortage.

**WOULD THERE BE
ADDITIONAL COSTS IF I
TAKE MY FAMILY WITH ME?**

Yes. As an international student on a student (temporary) visa you will have to pay international tuition fees for your children to go to school in Australia or New Zealand (state or private). Fees vary according to the age of your children and the state or territory you live in, but expect fees of A\$4,000 to A\$17,000 per year, per child in Australia and around NZ\$9,000 to NZ\$15,000 per year, per child in New Zealand.

Is there any help available to pay for my study costs?

Not really. As an international student studying in Australia or New Zealand you will be paying international student fees, and will generally need to be self-financed to pay for these and for your living costs. In Australia there are some scholarships available through the Australian Government Endeavour VET Awards. For details of this scholarship scheme please see <https://internationaleducation.gov.au/endeavour%20program/pages/endeavour-programs-landing.aspx>. It's also worth checking to see whether your chosen college in Australia or New Zealand offers scholarships of any kind.

Where can I find help on schools?

Please contact Study Options for advice if you are intending to travel as a family. School costs can vary hugely depending on the level of your study, the subject you do and where you are, and our team are experts at guiding you through all of that information. For example, in New Zealand if you study a qualification in an area of long term skill shortage (as specified on New Zealand's long term skill shortage list) you will not have to pay international school fees for your children at all. Please see www.studyoptionscolleges.com/ schools for more information.

Will I need medical insurance?

Yes. In Australia it is a visa requirement for you (and your family, if applicable) to have Overseas Student Health Cover throughout your time in the country as a student. A 12 month OSHC policy for someone on their own will cost around A\$500, family cover will vary according to the size of the family. In New Zealand it's a requirement of the New Zealand Ministry of Education that all international students have appropriate health and travel insurance for the duration of their studies – prices vary depending on circumstances but a basic policy will cost around NZ\$500 per year for single cover.

I've been told that if I study a certain course I'll get permanent residency of Australia or New Zealand afterward. Is this true?

Study Options is not a migration agency and so cannot advise on migration issues, but please note that the immigration policies of Australia and New Zealand change regularly, so no one can guarantee you such an outcome. Immigration policy can also change over the time you're studying. We'd strongly recommend you study something you enjoy, rather than picking a course because you think it will prove to be your ticket into either country. If you are hoping to stay on permanently after your course, it's important to get professional advice from a registered migration agent.

Can I work while I'm studying?

Yes. On a student visa in Australia you can work up to 40 hours per fortnight during term-time, and full time in the holidays. In New Zealand you can work 20 hours per week.

I'm not sure what – or where – I want to study. Who can I go to for advice?

CAN I BUY A HOUSE?

You can buy property in Australia on a student visa, but you must first seek approval from the Foreign Investment Review Board (www.firb.gov.au). Some useful websites are www.domain.com.au and www.realestate.com.au. New Zealand places no restrictions on buying property as a student visa holder. A good website to start your search is www.realestate.co.nz



How to apply

Follow this simple, step-by-step guide to make your application

1 Get in touch
Contact Study Options – call us on 020 7353 7200 or send an email to mail@studyoptions.com – to discuss your situation. 3 Get an application form
Once you've decided which course and college to apply to, we will send you the application form and an in-depth guide to making an application.

4 Make your application
Send your application to Study Options. We check to make sure everything is correct and complete. If you have asked us to certify documents, we'll do that at this point too, and return the originals to you by recorded delivery. Once everything is ready to go, we send your application to the college to be assessed.

5 Get a decision
It usually takes up to four weeks for the college to decide whether to offer you a place. If you have been given an offer, we will send through your letter of offer and a guide to what happens next.

Once you have accepted your place and the college application process is complete, we will help you apply for a student visa, open a bank account in Australia or New Zealand and anything else you need to do before you start the course.

Christchurch: Building a city for the future

Following the earthquake of 2011, the rebuild of the South Island's largest city is creating a wealth of opportunities. The Christchurch rebuild is estimated to be a NZ\$40 billion opportunity that will drive decades of growth and development for the city and the wider region.

The rebuild means some NZ\$4 billion in infrastructure repair that will result in state of the art utilities, digital networks and services; huge commercial design and development opportunities as the city's existing commercial space is set to triple; and massive residential development as more than 130,000 homes are repaired or replaced. The rebuild needs an influx of skilled people from a wide range of sectors and trades.

Christchurch already has well-established, innovative colleges and universities that offer training and teaching in the areas the city needs. Student visas: New Zealand

Anyone enrolling as an international student on a course of three months or more in New Zealand will need a student visa. Here are the key things to know

What visa will I need to study?

If the course you want to study is no more than three months long, and you hold an NZ visitor's visa or permit, then you do not need to get a student visa or permit to study. If your course is due to take three months or longer to complete, you will need a student visa.

Is there an age limit?

No, there are no age limits to getting a student visa in New Zealand.

Can I still get a student visa if I've already used my working holiday visa?

Yes. The student visa and working holiday visa schemes are separate.

Can I work on a student visa?

Yes, up to 20 hours a week during term and in the holidays.

How much does it cost to apply for a New Zealand student visa?

Student visa applications from the UK currently cost £140, plus a processing fee of £24. Fees are subject to change so please check www.immigration.govt.nz before making your application.

Will I need to provide any character documents?

All applicants for New Zealand visas need to be of 'good character', which generally means you have no criminal convictions. If you have convictions or if you intend on remaining in New Zealand for more than 24 months you will need to provide police clearances from each country for which you have citizenship. You will also need to provide police clearances for every country you have lived in for five years or more since you turned 17.

Will I need to provide health documents?

As an international fee-paying student you do not need to provide any medical documents at the point of application unless the student visa application form (INZ 1012) or the student visa guide (INZ 1013) specifically indicates that you should. If INZ requires a medical or chest x-ray during assessment, a visa officer will be in touch to request this from you directly.

Can I take my partner with me?

It is not possible to add your partner to your student visa as a dependant. Your partner will need to apply for their own visa to be in New Zealand if he or she wishes to work or study. They can apply for a work visa as the partner of a student who is:

i) Studying for a qualification in an area of absolute skill shortage, as specified in the

Long Term Skill Shortage List, or
ii) studying for a postgraduate qualification.

If your course of study does not fall into either of these categories, your partner will need to apply to be in New Zealand of their own accord, for example under the Working Holiday Scheme, the Essential Skills Visa or the Skilled Migrant Category.

How long does it take to get?

Immigration New Zealand recommends you allow between four and six weeks for student visa processing.

How soon can I travel to New Zealand once I get my visa?

The visa is valid immediately upon issuing.

How long will my visa last?

The visa is valid for the duration of your course if it is up to 12 months long, or for the academic year for courses that are longer than a year.

What are my obligations?

You must hold comprehensive health insurance for the duration of your stay, as only residents and holders of two year or longer work permits are eligible for publicly funded health and disability services. You also have a legal obligation to be in New Zealand on a valid permit at all times. If you fail to remain in New Zealand lawfully you may be declined a permit to remain in or a visa to travel to the country in the future.

What will I need to apply?

You can submit an application online, or complete the Application To Study In New Zealand form, which is available from INZ or from Study Options (request a copy at mail@studyoptions.com). The application should be lodged at the New Zealand Visa Application Centre. You can make your application via Study Options, by post, or in person at the New Zealand Visa Application Centre, Burwood House, 14-16 Caxton Street, London, SW1H 0QY.

Anyone enrolling as an international student on a course lasting four months or more in Australia will need a student visa. Here are a few key things to know

What type of visa do I need?

For all programmes of study you will be applying for a subclass 500 student visa. This must be applied for online at www.border.gov.au/Trav/Visa-1/500-

Is there an age limit?

There is no age limit on applying for a student visa for Australia.

Can I still get a student visa if I've already had a working holiday visa for Australia?

Yes, your working holiday visa status has no impact on a student visa application – the two types of visa are completely separate.

How much does it cost?

The visa application fee is currently A\$550. This fee needs to be paid when you submit your application. Please note that visa application charges are reviewed on July 1 each year. If you have dependents joining you on your student visa there will be additional fees payable.

How long does the visa last?

Your student visa will last for the duration of your study programme (including holiday periods) and will allow you some time to remain in Australia at the end of the course. This can range from one to three months, depending on the length of your course and the month in which it ends. If you are taking a course that is longer than ten months and which ends in November or December, for example, your student visa will usually end on March 15 the following year.

How long does it take to get?

Visa processing times vary but you should

allow up to four weeks and we would recommend applying for your visa as soon as you have received your CoE.

When can I travel to Australia?

You can arrive in Australia on your student visa up to 90 days before your course starts.

Can I work while on this visa?

On a student visa you will be able to work up to 40 hours a fortnight during term time, and full time in the holidays. The visa will automatically be issued with 'permission to work' although you are not allowed to begin working until your course has started. Work that is a formal, registered part of your course is not included in the limit. If you do unpaid or voluntary work you must still apply for permission to work. This type of work is included within the 40 hour limit.

Can I take my partner with me on my visa?

Yes, it is possible for your partner to accompany you to Australia as a dependent on your student visa. You will need to prove you have been in a genuine and exclusive relationship with them for at least 12 months. This usually requires you to have been living together for at least 12 months.

What will I need to apply?

Your country of passport and which college you will be going to will determine what evidence you need to show for your student visa application. Please use the document checklist tool at www.border.gov.au/Trav/Visa-1/500- to check this before making your application. You will also require your Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE), the application fee, your passport number, and



WHEN SHOULD I APPLY?

You can only make an application for an Australian student visa after you have received a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) from your chosen college. In order to get a CoE, you must have been given a formal offer by the college, have accepted it in writing and paid the required deposit toward your tuition fees.

evidence that you have paid for Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) insurance.

Do I need to provide any health documents or checks for the visa application?

Currently citizens of the UK or Ireland are not required to have a health assessment except in certain circumstances – for example if you are going to Australia to train as a nurse or other professional healthcare worker, or if you are likely to work or train in an Australian childcare centre during your course. You may also be required to do a health assessment if you have spent more than three consecutive months in another country in the last five years.

Can I apply for another visa when my course ends?

In some circumstances it may be possible to apply for a further visa at the end of your course. Please visit the Australian Department of Immigration and Citizenship



at www.border.gov.au to find out what your options are. Under current rules, if you have studied a two year course that leads to a profession on the skilled occupations list (SOL) you may be eligible to apply for a Post Study Work Visa (subclass 485) under the Graduate Work stream. There may be other visa available to you at the end of the course depending on your circumstances, where in Australia you study and the course you have taken.

How do I apply?

Your obligations

- You must remain enrolled in a course registered on CRICOS (cricos.deewr.gov.au).
- You must maintain satisfactory attendance, as required by your education provider.
- You must make satisfactory course progress for each study period.
- You must advise your education provider of your home address within seven days of arriving in Australia. If you change address, you must tell your education provider within seven days.
- You must maintain suitable health insurance while in Australia. This can be done by obtaining OSHC.

Students are getting great experience by doing their practical work in PHA's Function Centre. There are many hospitality venues and hotels in Perth that are struggling to hire chefs and hospitality workers before the busy summer season. 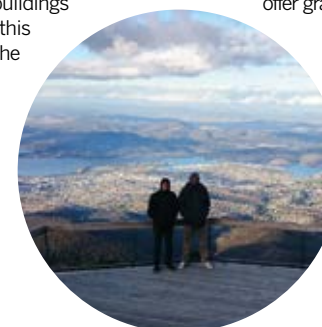
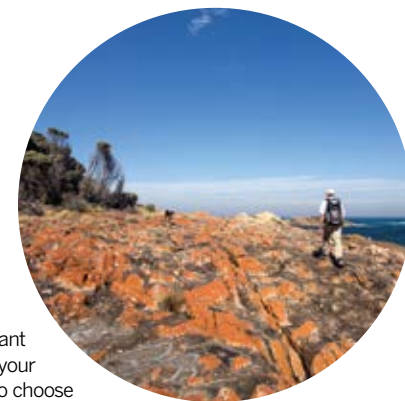

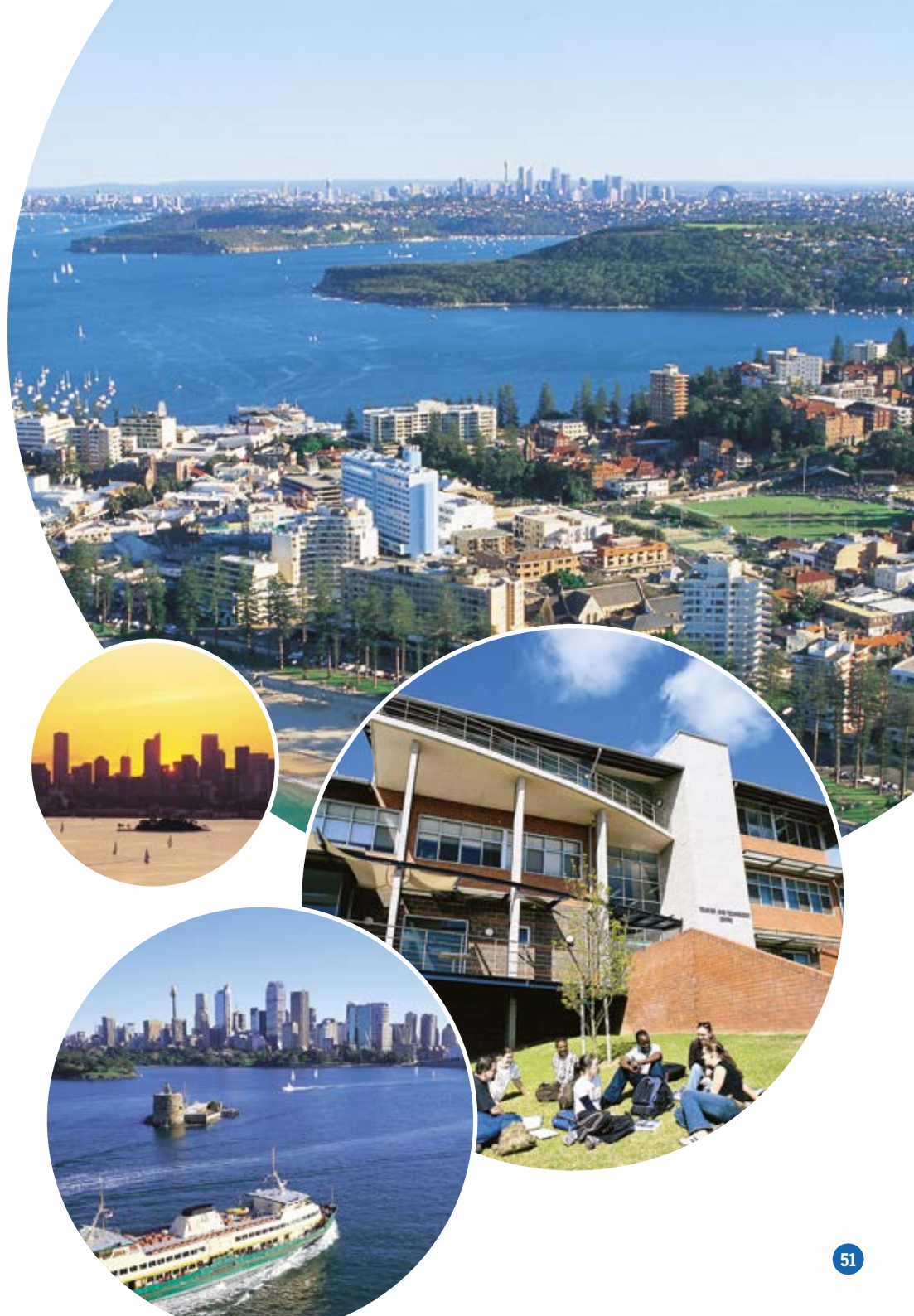
